She died April 17th, 1916, in Selma, Alabama, surrounded by loving friends of the race to whom she had devoted her long and useful life. She was buried in Nashville, Tennessee. The name of Johanna P. Moore should always be held in grateful memory, as one of that long line of heroic souls who consecrated their lives to the cause of freedom and justice for the Negro race.
