Assaulted on Street Car
An unknown man, crowd witnesses insisted upon, crowding passengers on a street car, became abusive when Richard Mason, 20, 545 Al-dine square, remonstrated with him. Before anyone could intervene he jerked out a knife and inflicted a five-inch cut on the body of Mason, and a two and one-half-inch cut on the shoulder. He then jumped off the car and made good his escape.

Loose Teeth in Accident
