OHIO WOMEN'S CLUBS IN 13th ANNUAL MEET

Ask Governor for Man on Censor Board

STEUBENVILLE, Ohio, July 11.—The 13th annual convention of the Ohio State Federation of Women's clubs set a precedent in its meeting here last week when a resolution was passed refusing to support insurance companies who do not give employment to members of our group.

The resolution came after the recommendation of the organization's militant president, Mrs. Lethia C. Fleming.

Officers of the state federation elected for a term of two years in 1929 were Mrs. Lethia C. Fleming, Cleveland, president; Mrs. Ethelyn Collins, Dayton, first vice president; Mrs. Mamie Chismon, Columbus, second vice president; Mrs. Lulu Brown, Urbana, recording secretary; Mrs. Mae Bascy, Cleveland, assistant recording secretary; Mrs. Sophia Bailey, Cleveland, corresponding secretary; Mrs. Hattie Moss, Lima, treasurer; Miss Hattie Q. Brown, parliamentarian; Mrs. Ollie Branch, historian; Mrs. Irene White, Steubenville, auditor; member at large, education, Mrs. Estelle R. Davis, Cincinnati; music, Mrs. Alberta Davis, Lima; chaplain, Mrs. Singleton, Delaware. The executive committee follows: Mrs. Margaret Barnes, Mrs. M. F. DeBraun, Mrs. Elizabeth Culpher, Mrs. Chattie Hamilton and Mrs. Clara Denmark. Trustees are Mrs. Della Fields, Toledo; Mrs. Olive Blake, Warren, and Mrs. Bessie Transue, Dayton.

Other features of the sessions were the presentation of a \$50 scholarship to Robert Coleman, valedictorian of the graduating class of Central high school, Cleveland, and a \$300 scholarship to Miss Addie Z. Williams, Cleveland. The Lethia C. Fleming loving cup for the best musical number, vocal and instrumental, went to a Columbus girl. The Mary C. Hinton loving cup was won by a Cincinnati club.

Mrs. Fleming in her annual address pledged to faithfully and honorably carry out the policies of the organization and to lend herself to her utmost capacity to reflect the highest aspirations of the club women in her actions as their leader. Among the several things recommended by Mrs. Fleming in her address was that any woman may become a life member of the organization by the payment of \$25 and that all past presidents shall become honorary presidents.

Over 100 delegates from the principal cities in the state were in attendance and it was acclaimed the best meeting in the history of the organization. After next year's meeting the state federation will hold its meetings biennially. The state was divided into districts with their presidents as follows: Northeast, Mrs. Margaret Barnes, Oberlin; northwest, Mrs. Jessie A. Gardner, Toledo, and southeast, Mrs. Izabella Isom, Columbus.

Greetings from the federation were sent to Hon. Oscar DePriest, congressman, and telegrams were sent to Mrs. Hattie Fairfax, Cleveland, a pioneer member of the federation; Mrs. Sarah G. Jones, poet-laureate, and Mollie DeBraun, past editress of the "Queen's Garden," now edited by Mrs. Ella P. Stewart, Toledo. A letter of sympathy was sent to Mrs. E. W. B. Curry, whose husband, Professor Curry, died suddenly last week.

The body petitioned Governor Cooper to appoint a member of our group as a member of the motion picture board of the state.
