

PROF. HILL SPEAKER ON UNIVERSITY DAY

Leslie Pinckney Hill, principal of the State Normal school at Cheney, Pa., in delivering the university day address at the St. James Presbyterian church Sunday afternoon declared that the present generation of Race students are too superficial. "We must produce more students who know how to study," said Mr. Hill, "and we must have more intensive scholarship on the part of our students."

Mr. Hill pointed out how in many cases education today was not giving and emphasizing the right values. "In too many cases," declared Mr. Hill, "Race students are imitating the vices of inferior white people, who do not furnish worthy examples for our youths to follow." He called attention to the sacrifices made by the older generation of men and women who stood for ideals. He said that this generation is facing the same problems that confronted them, and we must meet them with the same courage of our elders. Mr. Hill stressed the need of a better relationship between parents, teachers and children. He deplored the lack of respect so evident that children showed for their parents.

The occasion was the 10th annual university day. Cleveland G. Allen, who represented New York university, and the instigator of university day, presided. Prominent educators, teachers and students from every section of the country were in attendance. Tenants from the leading colleges and universities were displayed.

Others who made addresses were Miss Katharine Jenkins, on "The University Woman on the Threshold of a Career," representing Benedict college; Miss Olivia Tucker, on "Pharmacy as a Vocation for University Women," representing Columbia university; J. Egert Allen, on "Some Functions of Collegio Fraternities," representing Johnson C. Smith university; Dr. Anna C. Johnson, on "Dentistry as a Profession for University Women," representing Columbia university, and Miss Ethel K. Harris, representing the A. K. A.

University day was started in this city 10 years ago. It aims to bring together students and graduates of the leading colleges and universities in an annual program and to stimulate interest in education. Among those who have delivered the university day addresses are the late Dr. W. S. Scarborough, Bishop R. C. Ransom, Dr. E. P. Roberts and Dr. Kelly Miller.
