First Lady Recalls Y Service

The White House, Saturday, extended its felicitations to the Ninth Street Y.M.C.A. of Cincinnati. Dr. Charles E. Dillard, chairman of the Y Twentieth Anniversary Committee, is in receipt of a communication from President Roosevelt in which he reiterated statements he had made concerning the work of the organization as a whole.

Said the President: "The hope of this country, of every country, resides in its youth; in the possibility that the level of civilization attained and bequeathed to us by our fathers, with such gains as we have made, may be so incorporated in our children that they may be fortified to preserve what has come to them and to add to the richness of the inheritance. To your part in this great work, I pay high tribute. Your organization has fused the principles of the Christian life with the ancient ideal of a balanced mind and body as the effective instrument with which youth shall reach his goal." W. L. Anderson in commenting upon the President's letter, recalled that Mrs. Roosevelt is likewise deeply interested in the Y.M.C.A. program and at one time was a member of the Y staff. She was hostess of the Chamberly leave area during the war, at which time Anderson was an overseas Y.M.C.A. secretary. Anderson holds the first membership card issued by the Ninth Street branch. The dates

of the anniversary observance are Feb. 6 to 12.

20th Anniversary

"The Young People's Religious Parliament, which was established in 1934 will hold its mid-winter session on Friday and Saturday of this week," said Dr. Dillard. "This religious institute offers training to those who desire to become leaders. It is an illustration of the emphasis which the Y.M.C.A. is placing upon religious education. We believe that Christian motivation can be placed behind all the activities of life and it is to this task that the Y.M.C.A. is dedicated." Ralph W. Bullock of New York City will be the guest speaker at the parliament.
