Gift In Consideration Of \$250,000 Allocation For Race Members

May 13-The national board of Young Men's Christian associations. in session at the Jefferson hotel, here, Wednesday, May 4. officially accepted a conditional offer of \$25,000 made to the fiftieth anniversary fund of the colored department of the national council by the Rosenwald Family association, which is composed of the members of the family of the late Julius Rosenwald. partment of the national council by

The gift is made in consideration of a \$250,000 allocation for Race work included in the forward movement fund of the international committee of Young Men's Christian associations, and is conditioned on raising the belance of \$295,000

Race associations throughout the country are celebrating this year the fiftieth anniversary of the beginning of organized association work among the Race. This celebration is featuring the raising of \$125,000, or half of the \$250,000 fund mentioned above, and a national conference to be held in Washington, D. C., next November.

Mr. Tobias, in commenting on the Rosenwald gift, said that the outstanding factor in securing favorable consideration by the Rosenwald family was the cooperation of George R.
