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OFFERS NEW LIST OF LEADERS

Dear Editor:

I read with considerable interest a letter from Alabama concerning the leadership of the Negro race in America. The writer of the letter mentioned that fact of the white Americans choosing Booker T. Washington as leader of the Negro race and of the Negro's acquiescence in this choice at first and of their glorious approval of it after B. T.'s death. Such would be the case now, if a leader were chosen.

Negroes constitute less than one-tenth of the nation's population, are socially, economically, industrially and politically insignificant. At this stage of our development leadership really not approved by, if not actually chosen by the white Americans would be merely an entertaining spectacle so far as Americas is concerned.
