

Hundreds Express Grief At Editor Abbott's Death

Telegrams and messages poured into the office of the Chicago Defender and his home, following announcement Thursday morning of the death of Robert S. Abbott, founder and publisher of the World's Greatest Weekly.

Because of their great number, the Chicago Defender reprints but a few as typical of the hundreds received. Many others are acknowledged in the list which follows:

The death of Robert S. Abbott is a personal shock to me and a great loss to all Chicago. His public service as a leader of his people cannot be measured by his contributions to the welfare of his own race alone. America is a better place because he lived in it.
