Among the many issues of importance, discussed by able leaders were "The Dawn of the New Day for the Negro Woman" by Mrs. Ruth Wheeler; "Citizenship" by Mrs. Beatrice M. Grady; "Faith in the Home" by Mrs. Vandolia Martin; "Twelve Negro Women of Distinction in the Work of Rehabilitation and Adjustment" by Mrs. Frank S. Bledsoe; round table discussion on National Defense by E. G. Stager of the Social Planning Council, John T. Clarks of the Urban League, and Jackson Williams of the Legionnaires. Musical numbers interspersed these heavier numbers with many outstanding musicians participating.

An impressive memorial service was held for four officers who died during the past year, Mesdames Mildred V. Anthony and Rose Jenkins, past state presidents and Mesdames Sara E. Radford and Tena B. Henderson, chairmen of department.

MISSOURI N.A.C.G. GIVES PRIZES FOR BEST ART WORK AT STATE ANNUAL MEET

KINLOCH, Mo.—One hundred and sixty-four girls, representing 16 clubs, assembled at the Dunbar school, Kinloch, Mo., June 24 for the opening of the seventeenth annual session of the Missouri Association of Colored Girls.

Sessions were presided over by Miss Ardonia Abbott of Sedalia, Mo.

Winners of the state poetical contest were Ida Carter of Sedalia, first; Cadence Little, St. Louis, second; Maralyn Spears, Kirkwood, third. A reception followed the presentation of awards.

The Junior T.C.A. club of Sedalia, Miss Morine Carter, president, received the silver loving cup for the best art work for 1941-42. Miss Carter also received two blue ribbons on one article alone. Miss Ruth Clark is club art chairman and state art chairman.

In the state financial contest, Miss Morine Carter received first prize, also; Miss Mary Los O'Guinn of Kinloch, second; Miss Joy Hooper of St. Louis, third.

All officers were re-elected unanimously. Miss Julia Richards of Sedalia was elected state pianist.

52 RACE WOMEN LAWYERS LISTED IN BAR JOURNAL

Fifty-two women are practicing lawyers in the U. S., of whom 60 per cent are self-supporting, with incomes ranging from \$1500 to \$4000 a year.

These statistics are furnished by Dr. Sadie T. M. Alexander, a member of the Philadelphia Bar, in a story on women lawyers in the initial publication of the National Bar Journal.

Constituting about 5 per cent of the colored lawyers, female barristers are distributed as follows:

New York Leads
Twelve in New York, eleven in Illinois, six in Ohio, four in D. C., four in Massachusetts, three each in Virginia and California, one each in Pennsylvania, Wisconsin, Rhode Island, Minneapolis, Oregon, Oklahoma, Missouri, Michigan and Indiana.

Dr. Alexander said that question-

naires addressed to the women indicate that 80 per cent of them hold undergraduate degrees from leading American universities, and that 95 per cent of them are graduates of approved schools of law. In addition, many hold graduate degrees.

The first colored woman to be admitted to the bar was Miss Charlotte E. Ray, who began practice in Washington in May, 1872, upon her graduation from Howard university.
