

Annual Day Conference Of Youth Advisors Planned

GREENSBORO, N. C.—Bennett college will be the scene of the annual conference of Advisers to Youth in Schools of North Carolina, Saturday, November 1. The conference program this year will be in two parts, a morning session and an afternoon session. Registration will be at 9 a.m. for the morning session in the Henry Pfeiffer Science hall.

The first session will start at 10 a.m., and will be devoted to a general discussion of the theme, "The Negro Woman in Retrospect and Prophecy." The following outstanding persons will lead the discussion: Dr. Mary McLeod Bethune, National Youth Administration, Washington, D. C.; Miss Juanita Thompson, chairman, Committee on Standards of the American Association of College Women; Dr. Florence Read, president, Spelman college, Atlanta, Ga., and others to be added. Ample time will be allowed for open discussion from the floor following the major contribution of the speakers.

The afternoon session beginning at 2 p.m., will be broken into seminar discussions centering around the theme, "The Negro Woman in Retrospect and Prophecy." Interesting seminars will include the following topics: "Earning a Living," "Communication," "Health—Mental and Social," "Consumer Education," "Community Leadership and Citizenship," "Home and Family Life," "Recreation," "Religion and Philosophy of Life," and "The Negroes Contribution to American Culture."

The following individuals have been tentatively secured to lead many of the above seminars: Dr. John Cassells, Consumer Education division the President's Advisory Counsel on National Defense, Washington, D. C.; Dr. Edgar Dale, Bureau of Educational Research, Ohio State university; Dr. Alain Locke, Department of Philosophy, Howard university; Dr. Charlotte Hawkins Brown, president, Palmer Memorial institute, Sedalia, N. C.; Dr. R. I. Johnson, Stephens college, Columbia, Mo., and Miss Dorothy Height of New York City.

A "Findings Report" on the area discussions will immediately follow at 4 p.m.

All meetings of the conference will be held in the Henry Pfeiffer Science hall. There will be no fee for registration. A luncheon in Wilbur F Steele hall, the college dining center, will be held following the morning session.

The conference this year will be held at a most opportune time as a full week-end of activities for Friday, October 31, Saturday, November 1, and Sunday, November 2, has been planned. These events, including the conference are listed as follows.

Friday, October 31, 4 p.m.—Founders' Day celebration will be held at which time the college will present an honorary degree to Mrs. Henry Pfeiffer of New York City.

Friday, October 31, 8 p.m.—Organ recital featuring Orrin Clayton Suthern, distinguished organist from Florida A. and M. college, Tallahassee, will be given in the Annie Morner Pfeiffer chapel.

Saturday, November 1, 10 a.m. and 2 p.m.—"Conference of Advisers to Youth in Schools of North Carolina." The theme for this conference is "The Negro Woman in Retrospect and Prophecy." General sessions in the Henry Pfeiffer Science hall.

Saturday, November 1, 8:15 p.m.—A pageant centering around the theme of the conference will be given in the Little Theatre on the campus.

Sunday, November 2—The dedication of the Annie Merner Pfeiffer Chapel, a recent gift of Mrs. Henry Pfeiffer of New York City costing approximately \$150,000, will take place. This event promises to be very colorful and full of many inspiring addresses by leaders in the field of woman's education.
