

Open Free Schools In Baha'i Work

WILMETTE, Ill. —Four summer schools designed to foster the spirit of fellowship in an atmosphere of trust and good-will, with courses on a variety of themes related to religion and ethics offered in tuition-free sessions, are getting under way for the season.

These are the Baha'i summer schools, established in three regional centers, for the three major divisions of the North American continent, in Geyserville, in the California hills (1927); at Green Acre, situated on the banks of the Piscataqua in the state of Maine (1929) and at Louhelen Ranch near Davidson, Mich. (1931).

A fourth, the International school, founded at Pine alley, Colorado Springs, Colorado, has been dedicated particularly to the training of Baha'i teachers wishing to serve in other lands and especially in Latin America.

With steadily expanding programs, the Baha'i summer schools in the United States, open to Baha'is and ono-Baha'is alike, have set an example for other countries where several other Baha'i summer schools have been organized in recent years.
